#### Seeding Rates:

1/2 oz for up to 50 sq ft (approx. 5'x10' plot)  
1oz for up to 100 sq ft (approx. 10'x10' plot)  
Do not seed thicker than these rates. Perennial species will not have enough space to expand and mature and you will get too many annuals the first year that could shade out the perennials emerging underneath, which need sunlight to grow and develop.
